HOUSES IN THANET - 1565

From a newspaper cutting from a scrap book.

[Probably from the Keble's Gazette of the 1880's, written by the Rev. W. Benmam B.D. late Vicar of Margate.]

1565

"A manuscript in the Cotton Library British Museum, gives the following certificate of the state of the coast of Thanet in 1565, signed by the Queen's Commissioners, -

Ramsgate hath houses Boats and other vessels from 3 to 10 tons Men appertaining to these boates for fishing and carrying of grain	25 14 70
Broadstairs hath houses Boates and other vessels from 2 to 12 tons Men employed in them	98 8 40
Margate hath houses Persons lacking proper Habitatacyons Boates and other vessels from 1 to 40 tons Persons employed in carrying of grain and fishing	108 8 10 60
Birchington hath houses But hath neither shippe nor boate	42

This last piece of information adds very strongly to my argument that Birchington was of some significance in Thanet – and clearly more than a town like Ramsgate – in the mid to late Medieval and early Tudor periods.
