Served by 2 Doctors – Dr Harry Worthington & Dr Walter Brunton There were no lady doctors in England at this time.

2 Ladies in charge – Miss Tett Mrs Lloyd-Jones

Lady Workers – 102 Opened Nov 1915 closed 25 Mar 1919

12,600 articles made and sent to the hospitals in Birchington And troops abroad

Including - bandages, slings

+ woollen scarves, socks etc (sent to Central Depot in London These items wee sent to Soldiers, Airmen and Sailors

Over £660 was raised locally in donations from subscriptions, entertainments and sales of flowers and collecting of waste paper.

Special Choir for Soldiers' Services

There were 10 ladies in the Choir at the start of the War, as well as 4 civilian men and 12 soldiers (these men changed depending on their army unit postings.)

Quite a few also served in London, Bromley and Bickley near London

When the War ended, very few women continued to work outside their homes – handing over their jobs to the men who came back from the War. This was very difficult for them, because many of them had enjoyed the responsibility and work they did.
