PORT OF BIRCHINGTON.

There was an interesting point at a meeting of the Birchington Council this week, when the possibility of boat trips to the village from a neighbouring port was indicated. Birchington has not been associated with boating trips in recent years, and the prospect of passengers arriving by sea six score at a time is almost sensational for Birchington, The Council have dealt with the matter delicately, but we hope they will neither pander to nor be timid of the tripper element. quietude of bungalow town is not likely to appeal to the noisy tripper. WESTGATE AND BIRCHINGTON PROBLEMS.

The need of widening the bridge on the railway at Birchington is generally recognised, but the negotiations launched with a view to effecting the improvement have not got very far. It is felt locally that, seeing the general nature of much of the traffic over the bridge, the whole cost of alteration should not be made a parochial charge, and the suggestion is made that the Roads and Bridges Committee of the Kent County Council should assist in the matter.

Caught instead.—Having lost 45 chickens from a field in the last eight weeks, George Thomas Chittenden, of Parkavenue, Birchington, was on his way to keep watch for thieves when he was stopped by P/O Munns for cycling without a light. Fined 10s, at Margate police court on Wednesday, Chittenden said he thought it was very unfair.

Bus Passenger's Mishap.—About 4 p.m. on Friday last, an Isle of Thanet Tramway Company's bus was running into Birchington when the top hit a swinging sign board outside Messrs. Jenner's garage. The board was knocked off and hit Thomas Roberts, of Devonport-road. Shepherds Bush, a passenger on the top of the bus, on the nose, slightly cutting it.

9th June 1923

P.C. Farley must have blinked when he encountered 26 heifers straying at night in Dane-road and Dane-avenue, Birchington.

"They were walking over the front lawns of several houses," said the officer at Margate Police Court, on Wednesday, when Douglas Phillip Ledger, of The Elms, Sarre, was summoned for allowing the animals to stray on the evening of 12th June.

Unable to ascertain where heifers had strayed from, the officer had them impounded for the night.

Later he ascertained that they had strayed from a meadow near Reculvers and was told by the defendant that men who were mending the sea wall for the County Catchment Board must have left the gate unfastened.

Mr. Ledger explained that men were repairing the sea wall and undoubtedly someone had left the field gate open, allowing the cattle to get out,

A fine of 10s. was imposed.

NATERED MILK.

BIRCHINGTON FARMER FINED.

A fine of £20, with £8 12s. 6d. costs was inflicted on Ben Offen, of Quex Park Farm, Hirchington, at the Cinque Ports Petty Sessions at Margate on Monday for sell-ing milk in course of delivery to Mr. B. W. Hedgecock, of Garlinge, which con-

contained 20.2 per cent. of added water.

The case had been adjourned from
December 19th for the third sample to
be analysed and the Clerk informed the Bench that the certificate from Somerset

House showed the sample to contain not less than 21 per cent. of added water.

Mr. J. Thorn Drury appeared for the prosecution and the samples were taken at the dairy by Mr. Ernest Richardson, the inspector under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act, appointed by the Rural District Council.

Mr. S. Shea, for the defendant, said that Mr. Offen had been in business as a dairy farmer for some years and this was the first time he had ever been before a Bench of magistrates for any offence under the Food and Drugs Act and that was a very material fact in his favour.

The Bench found the defendant guilty of adding water to the milk and Colonel Hill said they considered it was a bad case, in fact one of the worst they had had for a considerable time. The only had for a considerable time. The only thing to mitigate the punishment was the fact that although defendant had been in business for 12 years there was no record against him.

BIRCHINGTON COUNCIL FEARS

The view that Birchington would lose its individuality by incorporation with Margate was expressed by the Chairman (Councillor A. Hodges) and Councillor G. B. Farrar at the monthly meeting of the Birchington Pariels Council on Wednesday.

It was stated that the flag days granted by the Council would stand this year, and that in future the question of flag days would be considered Margate Entertainments mittee.

Several councillors asked if special days would be granted, as at present, for local organisations, and Councillor Hodges considered that they would gradually be eliminated.

Similar opinion was voiced by Coun-cillor Farrar, who declared that Birchington would lose its individuality, and Councillor W. Curtis spoke of the great work carried out locally by the Birchington Cheerful Sparrows. A flag day, he said, was essential to them, for although the Margate Sparrows were a wonderful organisation, the Birchington Sparrows did more for the individual poor and sick in the town than any similar organisa-tion in the district. He stressed the fact that the Birchington Sparrows concentrated mainly upon individuals.
